Frequently Asked Questions and Answers

Why is Whiskers Park closed for 2025 season?

In November 2024, an engineering assessment of the four log stringer bridges (circa ~1970s) within the park were assessed to have zero load rating and deemed unsafe to vehicle traffic. These bridges have reached end of life. This effectively blocks access to the campground and for public safety, the park is closed.

Alternate solutions such as temporary bridges were examined. It was determined the cost and regulatory requirements were prohibitive to effectively open the park.

What is BC Parks doing and when will Whiskers Park open again?

BC Parks is actively working on deactivation plans and procurement of new bridges for construction. All four bridges will be completed at the same time, and it is anticipated construction will commence mid to late summer into fall, 2025.

BC Parks anticipates Whiskers Point Park will open for 2026. Please check the BC Parks website for progress updates.

Will I be able to access the boat launch?

No. For security and public safety, the park will remain closed.

I always camped at Whiskers, where can I go now?

Our family in Prince George / Mackenzie always went to Whiskers for the beach and playground for our young kids, now where can I go?

In region, for similar experiences as Whiskers Point Park please check: Crooked River Park, Purden Lake Park, Sowchea Bay Park, Paarens Beach Park, Beaumont Lake Park, Ten Mile Lake Park and Heart Lake within Pine Le Moray Park.

For highway traffic travelling north to or from Alaska along Highway 97, Crooked River Park and Tudyah Lake Park each provide alternate options for route planning.
