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CONKLE LAKE PROVINCIAL PARK Purpose Statement and Zoning Plan

Conkle Lake Park is a semi-wilderness area of 587 hectares located northwest of Rock Creek and west of Westbridge in the Kettle River drainage. Access is by gravel road from Highways 3 and 33.

The **primary purpose** of Conkle Lake Park is to protect the lake and its associated ecosystem typical of the southern Okanagan Highlands. The park lies at an elevation of about 1,070 metres and has a mixed forest of lodgepole pine and immature western larch. The 3 kilometre-long Conkle Lake is one of the largest of the higher elevation lakes in the Okanagan Highlands.

The park is one of 17 protected areas in the under-represented Northern Okanagan Highland Ecosection, contributing a small percentage of the hectares protected. Four very under-represented biogeoclimatic subzones/variants in the ecosection are present (ICHmk1, IDFdm1, MSdm1 and Water). The park protects about one third of the Water zone and about 10% of IDFdm1 biogeoclimatic subzone/variant in the ecosection. No CDC sites for species at risk have been recorded. The park has good deer, elk and moose habitat. The creek has outlet spawning for rainbow trout contributing about 20% of the trout to the lake's fishery.

The **secondary purpose** of the park is to provide camping and a variety of day use outdoor recreation opportunities associated with the lake and its upland. The park is a popular destination campground for local residents and tourists. Facilities include 34 campsites, two group campsites, car top boat launch and trails to nearby falls and along the lake. The lake has been stocked with rainbow trout and fishing is one of the most popular activities. Two rustic log cabins, one of which is used by the public, are the remains of a former fishing resort. In good snow years, the cabin is a destination for snowmobilers. In the fall, the campground is a base-camp for hunters.

Zoning

The north end of the park is zoned Intensive Recreation to provide vehicle accessible camping and lake-oriented recreation activities (approximately 19% of the park). The remainder of the park (approximately 81%) is zoned Natural Environment to protect its undeveloped natural values.
