Primary Role

The original role of Cottonwood River Provincial Park was to provide riverside recreational access, as well as day use and overnight camping opportunities for local residents. The area was flooded in the early 1990's and all facilities were removed and the site decommissioned.

• ecosection	Minimal contribution to the extremely poorly represented Quesnel Lowland Ecosection (0.75%) Cottonwood River is 1 of 7 small parks contributing to the representation of this ecosection. Of these, only Fraser River Park contributes more than 1,000 ha. Nevertheless, Cottonwood River's contribution is negligible (only 1.74% of the overall protected area representation of this ecosection).
• biogeoclimatic subzone/variant	Minimal contribution to the poorly represented SBSdw1 variant (1.29%). Cottonwood River is 1 of only 6 parks contributing to the representation of this variant but its contribution is minimal (only 1.37% of the overall protected areas system representation of this variant). Schoolhouse Lake Park is the major contributor (89.12%).
