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Primary Role

The **primary** role of Dixie Cove Marine Park is to provide a strategic anchorage in the Kyuquot Sound area off the west coast of Vancouver Island. Located on Hohoae Island, the park has two of the best all-weather anchorages in the area. From these strategic overnight anchorages, it is possible for boaters and kayakers to explore nearby Rugged Point Marine Park and the rest of Kyuquot Sound, including Brooks Peninsula and Big Bunsby parks. As it is a scenic stopping point for those who are exploring the west side of Vancouver Island by boat, it serves to meet the travel corridor system goal for the Protected Area Strategy.

Secondary Role

The **secondary** role is to protect the natural values associated with the temperate rainforest on the west coast of Vancouver Island. Much of this type of forest has been developed through forestry and is no longer in its natural state. By protecting the coastal fringe, the park protects old growth forest of sitka spruce and Douglas fir, and coastal habitat for marine life such as salmon and geoducks and wildlife such as sea otters, migrant gray whales, diving ducks, seabirds, shorebirds, and bald eagles.

Management Issues

Known Management Issue	Response
Lack of knowledge about natural and cultural values	 Inventory ecological values to better understand upland and marine values. Undertake a cultural inventory and traditional use study in conjunction with First Nations.
Impact of adjacent activities such as woodlot development and aquaculture	 Liaise with forest companies and Ministry of Forests to ensure that adjacent forest development does not impact park values, especially visual resources. Inform aquaculture companies of concerns, and encourage moving fish farms away from the park boundary.
Impacts on water quality in anchorage by boat sewage	 Work with DFO to establish a no dumping regulation. Develop and implement a water quality monitoring program if resources allow. Increase public awareness through signage and website about impacts of dumping.
Lack of park awareness	 Install boundary signage. Enhance interpretation information on website.

Zoning

Natural Environment Zone – covers the entire park in recognition of the natural and recreational values. The objective of this zone is to protect scenic values and to provide recreation opportunities in a largely undisturbed natural environment.

Conservation Representation \boxtimes - ecosection Dixie Cove Marine Park contributes very minimally (0.05%) to the Windward Island Mountains Ecosection (WIM), which is well represented in the protected areas system at 17.4%.
