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HITCHIE CREEK PROVINCIAL PARK Purpose Statement and Zoning Plan

Primary Role

The **primary** role of Hitchie Creek Park is to protect old growth lowland rainforest and freshwater ecosystems. This 226-hectare park is located in the Nitinat Lake watershed and is adjacent to the northeasterly boundary of the West Coast Trail Unit of Pacific Rim National Park Reserve. It adds to the conservation values protected in the Nitinat Lake portion of the national park, in particular values associated with Hitchie Lake and Creek. Hitchie Creek is a salmon-bearing stream and is important for anadromous cutthroat trout, a blue-listed species. The old growth forest habitat protected in Hitchie Creek Park and the adjacent national park provides a key wildlife corridor for large species moving through the watershed. A wide range of species, from salamanders to songbirds, reside in here, including the large predators of Vancouver Island -- cougar, black bear and gray wolf. The park protects potential habitat for the endangered marbled murrelet and Keen's long-eared myotis, while the vulnerable Roosevelt elk travel the river corridor.

Additionally, this park adds to the representative value of the national park in protecting the submontane very wet maritime variant of the Coastal Western Hemlock biogeoclimatic zone (CWHvm1) which is under represented in the protected areas system. The characteristic understory of false azalea, bunchberry, and oval-leaved blueberry occurs in this western hemlock forest.

Secondary Role

The **secondary** role is to provide wilderness recreation opportunities. This undeveloped park provides opportunities for wilderness camping, sport fishing, hiking, nature appreciation and exceptional wildlife viewing. There is no road or boat access to the park, which can only be reached by hiking from Hitchie Lake or Nitinat Lake within the adjacent Pacific Rim National Park Reserve. Nearby Nitinat Lake is a popular recreation destination for swimmers, boaters, paddlers and anglers.

Lack of management presence given difficult access and staffing pressures	Investigate opportunities to develop stewardship agreements with local groups. Work closely with Parks Canada staff in monitoring boundaries and identifying management issues.	
Unknown cultural values	Work with local First Nations to undertaken cultural values assessment and traditional use study.	

Zoning

Natural Environment Zone – covers the entire park (225 hectares) to reflect the conservation and recreation values. The objective of this zone is to protect scenic values and to provide recreation opportunities in a largely undisturbed natural environment.
