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KENTUCKY-ALLEYNE PROVINCIAL PARK Purpose Statement and Zoning Plan

The 144 hectare Kentucky-Alleyne Park is located just off Highway 5A, about 38 km south of Merritt and 11 km south of the Coquihalla Connector/Highway 5A junction. The park encompasses the scenic rolling grassland and dry, open forests surrounding Kentucky and Alleyne lakes.

The park's **primary purpose** is to provide a variety of lake and upland-oriented outdoor recreation opportunities.

The park's excellent features and good access for coast and southern interior residents/travellers makes it a popular destination for camping, fishing, canoeing/boating, swimming and walking. Some snowmobiling and winter fishing also occur. Facilities include 63 campsites, trails and a car-top boat launch on each lake. There are no formal beaches.

The **secondary purpose** of the park is to protect the ecosystems typical of the dry interior zone of the Thompson Plateau. The park includes portions of Kentucky and Alleyne lakes and a variety of glacial features.

The park is one of the smaller contributors of the under-represented South Thompson Upland Ecosection, accounting for only 0.59% of the province-wide protected area in the ecosection. In terms of biogeoclimatic representation, it contributes less than 1% of the under-represented IDFdk1 province-wide. The park contains no CDC records for species at risk.

Zoning

The entire park (144 hectares) is zoned Intensive Recreation to provide camping and low intensity lake and upland-oriented day use recreation opportunities in a natural setting.
