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### MEMORY ISLAND PROVINCIAL PARK Purpose Statement and Zoning Plan

#### **Primary Role**

The **primary** role of Memory Island Provincial Park is to provide day use recreation opportunities in a lake setting. This approximate one-hectare island (0.915 hectares) located at the south end of Shawnigan Lake is a popular picnicking, swimming and boating site for local residents and visitors. It is valued as an attractive and unchanged retreat in the middle of the lake. Other recreation activities include walking, viewing, nature appreciation, bird watching, and cultural appreciation. Facilities include a rough trail around the island, five picnic tables, two pit toilets, a garbage can, and a memorial plaque for the donation of the park by the families of two young men killed in the Second World War. Established in 1945, this park is one of the smallest parks in British Columbia and is significant for being the only public freshwater island on Southern Vancouver Island.

#### Secondary Role

The **secondary** role is to protect an entire small island in its natural state. Memory Island comprises rock outcrops amongst Douglas fir, pine and arbutus, and it protects nesting waterfowl during the spring because of its isolation from the mainland of the lake. Resident breeding birds observed include common merganser, belted kingfisher, and common snipe. Accessible only by boat, the island provides sanctuary and habitat for small mammals, birds, amphibians, reptiles, plants and fungi.

#### Management Issues

## Zoning

**Natural Environment Zone** – covers the entire park (0.915 hectares). The objective of this zone is to protect scenic values and to provide recreation opportunities in a largely undisturbed natural environment. The park will keep a minimum of facilities necessary to protect the natural features and to denote the island's park status and its memorial role. The park will continue to provide public access to lakeshore recreation opportunities while continuing to protect the natural and cultural values of the island.
