PETROGLYPH PROVINCIAL PARK Purpose Statement and Zoning Plan

Primary Role

The **primary** role of Petroglyph Provincial Park is to protect and present significant First Nations' petroglyphs found in this small two hectare park. Symbolic of the spiritual and cultural history of the Coast Salish and Snuneymuxw (Nanaimo) First Nations, these petroglyphs or rock paintings are over 1,000 years old. Located south of Nanaimo, the park offers visitors and local residents a quiet forested picnic and day use area to visit in addition to viewing the petroglyphs that are protected in cast molds and covered with plexiglass to help prevent vandalism.
