The area to the north and west of the road is zoned Intensive Recreation (approximately 8 ha or 27% of the park), while everything to the south and east is zoned Nature Recreation (approximately 22 ha or 73% of the park).

• ecosection		Contributes minimally to the representation of the very poorly-represented Cariboo Plateau Ecosection (0.68%). Ruth Lake is one of only 5 parks contributing to the representation of this ecosection. Only Schoolhouse Lake contributes more than 200 ha to the representation of the ecosection. Ruth Lake's contribution is only 0.55% of overall protected area system representation of this ecosection.		
• biogeoclimatic subzone/variant		A number of new Goal 2 protected areas are proposed for this ecosection which capture a range of natural features and ecosystems. Contributes minimally to the very poorly represented SBSdw1 variant (1.29%). Ruth Lake's contribution is only 0.48% of the overall protected area representation of this variant. Schoolhouse Lake is the major contributor (89.16%).
