

Conservation

Beginning in August, a parade of nearly half a million sockeye, coho and chinook salmon pass through the fish ladder on the way to their spawning beds. Fishing is not permitted but ample view points allow visitors to see this natural phenomena. Flowers, trees and shrubs are part of the park's natural heritage. Please do not damage or remove them.

Wildlife

Park users should always be aware of bears and other wildlife. Never feed or approach them.

Park Fees

Open all year. Fees are collected from May to October. Season dates and fees are subject to change – please check the website for current information.

Check-in: 1 p.m. for reservation holders; 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. for non-reservation holders. **Check-out:** 11 a.m. **Gates open** at 7 a.m. and **close** at 11 p.m.

What You Should Know



There are 23 campsites at this park. Campsite reservations are accepted and first-come, first-served sites are also available. For reservations call 1-800-689-9025 or www.discovercamping.ca. Maximum stay is 14 days. No electrical hookups are available.



There is a small day-use/picnicking area with picnic tables and parking area. Picnicking in campsites is not permitted.



There are no wheelchair accessible facilities at this park. You can view the river and access to the fish ladder is limited to more able persons. Contact the Regional Office for more information.



Cold water taps are located throughout the park. Taps are shut off between October 15 and April 15.



Only pit toilets available in the campground and day-use areas.



There are no sani-station/dump facilities at this park. Sani-stations are located in Port Alberni, Parksville and Coombs.



Firewood may be available for purchase. Campfire pits are provided. Group campfire facilities and/or limited burning hours may be designated at some campgrounds. Fire bans may be implemented during extremely hot weather conditions. Be prepared to bring a portable stove for cooking.



There are 2 kilometres of hiking/walking trails that lead to a great fish viewing area. Riverbanks can be very slippery. Stay away from cliff and riverbank edges. For your own safety and preservation of the park, obey posted signs and keep to designated trails. Shortcutting trails destroys plant life and soil structure.



River fishing. Some closures do occur and are posted at the park. All anglers must have a valid fishing license; refer to current *BC Environment Fishing Regulations Synopsis*.



Bicycles must keep to roadways. No cycling on trails.



Pets/domestic animals must be on a leash at all times and are not allowed in beach areas or park buildings. You are responsible for their behavior and must dispose of their excrement.

Special Notes

Please take valuables with you when leaving your vehicle or lock them in a secure location when leaving your campsite. All losses should be reported to the RCMP and park staff.

Riverbanks can be very slippery. Stay away from cliff and riverbank edges. Sections of this river contain waterfalls, strong currents and other hazards. Boating is not recommended.

The nearest public telephone is located at the Beaver Creek Market on Beaver Creek Road on the way to Port Alberni.

Alcohol consumption is permitted only within the boundaries of campsites with registered occupants of legal age.

Excessive noise, loud music, alcohol and parties are prohibited in the day-use area and campground.

Warning: No swimming at this park. Sections of this river contain waterfalls, strong currents and other hazards. Jumping from bridges and cliffs is prohibited. There are no lifeguards on duty at provincial parks.

Welcome to Stamp River

Provincial Park, an amalgamation of Stamp Falls and Stamp River Money's Pool. This park is located 14 kilometres north of Port Alberni off Hwy 4 on Beaver Creek Road. Visitors can relax near the lovely waterfall in this 327-hectare park. During the summer and fall, they can watch the salmon ascend the fish ladders. There are walking trails in the park to view beautiful waterfalls and rapids in a forest setting.
