Walsh Cove Marine Provincial Park Purpose Statement and Zoning Plan

Primary Role

The **primary roles** of Walsh Cove Marine Provincial Park are to protect a key marine anchorage and to protect First Nations cultural resources and sites. The park, although small in size, provides a safe anchorage, varied scenery, and a complex adjacent shoreline for exploration.

The park also protects First Nation archaeological sites. The combination of First Nation cultural sites which occur within Desolation Sound, Roscoe Bay, Okeover Arm, Walsh Cove, and Copeland Islands marine parks provide a significant opportunity for protection of cultural values and possibly presentation of these values in cooperation with the First Nations. Sites are rich in value and very diverse in type – they range from shoreline harvest and settlement sites, to fish traps and marine harvest areas, and to burial and spiritual sites.

Zoning

<u>Natural Environment</u> - All of the park is zoned Natural Environment. This zone will protect the upland, marine and cultural values, will allow marine recreation opportunities, and will allow only very limited levels of facility development. The focus of this zone will be to create a balance between resource protection, moderate levels of use, and recreation opportunities.

Representation - ecosection		Very minor contributor to the representation of the poorly represented Outer Fiordland Ecosection (OUF). Only 3.3% of this ecosection is protected. Teakerne Arm contributes only 0.87% of the overall protected area representation of this ecosection. Walsh Cove contributes only 0.49% to the representation of the Johnston Strait <i>Marine</i> Ecosection (JS) which is only 3.70% protected. Ranks 14th out of 16 in terms of contribution. Very minor contributor to the representation of the under-represented CWHdm. Only 5.89% of this subzone is protected. Teakerne Arm contributes only 0.37% of the overall protected area representation of this subzone.
