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WHISKERS POINT PROVINCIAL PARK

Whiskers Point Park is located on the eastern shore of McLeod Lake, along Highway 97, 130 km north of Prince George. It is 116 ha in size and consists of a sandy point and an area of old growth forest.

Primary Role

The park's primary role is to provide lakeshore recreation for Highway 97 travellers and for regional residents. 69 campsites are provided, and a popular adventure playground is located nearby the sandy beach.

Secondary Role

In 2000, 40 ha were added to the park to contribute to the representation of the wet, cool subboreal spruce forest.

Zoning

Whiskers Point Park includes two different zones:

- Intensive Recreation (provision of a variety of readily accessible, facility-oriented outdoor recreation opportunities) approximately 49% of the park.
- Natural Environment (protection of scenic values and provision of backcountry recreation opportunities in a largely undisturbed natural environment) approximately 51% of the park.

Within a 75 km radius, Pine Le Moray, Bijoux provincial parks and one ER are also included.

Partnerships Vulnerability Х Forest health issues The Conservation Risk Assessment Process identified 2 risk factors (the shape and the size of the park) for the park and rated them as moderately significant. Four stressors/threats were identified for the park: day use, forest harvesting activity, roadways and petrochemical spill/potential which were all rated as low significance. Whiskers Point was originally established in 1956 for **Relationship to Other** recreational purposes. A small addition to the north and **Strategies** south of the park to improve viability and representation was supported by the Prince George LRMP. However, the parcel of land to be included to the north of Whiskers was removed as part of the McLeod Lake Band settlement lands. 40 ha was added to the south to rationalize the boundaries and contribute to representation. Area: 116 hectares **Date of establishment:** Originally established March 16, 1956. 40 ha added to park on June 29, 2000.
